Work in Progress



Meet Sia. Sia's family wanted a 20 x20cm portrait of her in a wooden box frame.

They requested the background to be pastel colours particularly loved this photo of Sia. My first step of the process is to set up a picture and get an idea of how the background. Sia's family were happy so I got on with the sketching.



STEP 1.

But before I did that, I did a fun trial on a gel pad! For a first attempt, it wasn't too bad. I quite liked the missing sections. I will have another crack at this another time!




STEP 2

Using a grid I sketched out the outlines and then underpainted the background. Then applied the pastel background.



STEP 3.

After adding the background, I underpainted over my sketch lines using a brown paint. Then started to fill in the shades and highlights.



STEP 4.

My favourite part is adding the eyes. The shape of the nose didn't look quite right to me so I made a few tweaks before adding the final details.



STEP 5

Once I was happy with the face shape, I finished all the detail, shades and tones. Added some highlights and lowlights and used a fine pen for some white detail.



Sia's family were happy with the photo I sent of the painting so I signed it, varnished it and then put in the frame. Wrapped up and ready to go home.
